

Sailor and Nurse Seen Kissing in Memorial Park

What Is This?

On August 14, 1945, now known as VJ Day, the world learned that Japan had surrendered and WWII was over. As word spread across New York City, photographers headed towards Times Square to document the celebration. Photos of a sailor kissing a woman in a nurse's uniform have since become some of the most well-known images ever published. One by Navy photographer Victor Jorgensen, shown here, appeared in the *New York Times*.

Renowned American sculptor Seward Johnson created the 25-foot three dimensional portrayal of that moment, called *Embracing Peace* on display in Memorial Park on Woodward Avenue at 13 Mile Road.



Why Is It Here?

The Michigan WWII Legacy Memorial, the state's officially recognized tribute to it's contributions during the Second World War, will be built right here in Memorial Park. The Memorial honors Michigan's role on the war front and the home front as the Arsenal of Democracy and the birthplace of Rosie the Riveter.
